Typical owner-occupied home expenses:

Home Type Preference

Clarify your ideal: new construction, character homes with history, or low-maintenance townhomes

- 2** — 60–30 Days Out

 - Develop and execute offer strategy
 - Coordinate inspections and due diligence
 - Finalize moving logistics
 - Arrange temporary housing if needed
- 3** — First 30 Days After Arrival
Integration Phase
 - Set up utilities and essential services
 - Enroll children in schools
 - Update driver's license and vehicle registration
 - Connect with community resources

 **Pro Tip:** Starting early reduces stress and gives you negotiating power. Last-minute relocations often result in compromise purchases rather than ideal homes.
