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IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS

Below is a great starter list of documents you might find helpful when PCSing. Be sure to set them aside when the movers come so they don't inadvertently get shipped.

- List of important dates such as flights, HHG pick up, report dates, PCS leave dates, POV drop off/arrival dates
- Government Travel Card VERY IMPORTANT
- PCS Orders (have several copies on hand) plus a digital copy is always helpful
- Reservations for temporary lodging on Oahu (book early as they fill up quickly)
- Flight itineraries and tickets, rental car reservations (TURO is a more affordable car rental option. –think Airbnb for cars.)
- Pet importation documents such as medical records, 10-day health certificate, flight reservation for pet, airline approved crate (Island Pet Movers can handle shipment of pets)
- Sponsor's contact information PCS Leave form (hard copy)
- Family Documents: ID for all adults (military ID, driver's licenses, state IDs), birth certificates, marriage certificates, divorce decrees, custody paperwork for children (if applicable), social security cards, family care plan (for dual military or single parents), school transcripts, diplomas, professional certifications, resumes.
- Clearing Papers from past installation.
- HHG shipment paperwork, POV shipment paperwork (title/registration, insurance, spare keys/remotes, shipping authorization from lien holder if applicable), video or photos of HHG and POV (if applicable).
- Medical records, dental records, shot records, medication prescriptions, EFMP documentation
- Wills, POAs, legal documents
- Two previous years of tax returns, two previous years W-2s, credit card statements, bank statements, investment account statement (many of these may be digital), check book.



Cyclo Hawaii PCSing TIPS



Sign in off leave at the reception desk at the airport if you are in the Army. If you don't your TLA, COLA, Hawaii BAH, etc. will NOT start. You will be on your own and will not be reimbursed for any time or money spent on island while on PCS leave.

- If you are in another branch, follow your designated reporting procedures.
- Rental cars are not an authorized PCS expense, so if possible, ship your POV at least one month before your arrival to the island. If you find yourself in need of a rental car like most people are, TURO is an affordable alternative to the traditional rental car. The app is easily downloaded on most smart phones. Think of it like Airbnb for cars. In many cases they will meet you at the airport with the car.
- While staying in the hotel awaiting housing it is possible to pocket quite a bit of money. Your BAH, COLA, TLA, Per Diem and BAS will all be paid effective on your date of arrival. Since TLA covers the cost of the hotel room and Per Diem covers the cost of food you can save about \$1000 per week. You can stay in the hotel for up to 30 days in certain circumstances.
- Ensure you have an active GTCC (government travel credit card). If not your hotel and all other PCS expenses will have to be paid with your personal credit card and cash on hand. This can be difficult for many service members PCSing since many TLA approved hotels on Oahu cost \$177 per night.









TRANSPORTATION / Biki BIKES



Hui Car Share is the best way to rent a car in Hawaii. Book, change, or cancel reservations through the Hui app. With Hui, you can rent a car for an hour or day.

Unlock any type of car through the app – you don't need to meet a person to fill out paperwork or to pick up car keys. Hui Car Share is located blocks away from major hotels, apartments, and attractions across Honolulu. Find Hui locations in Waikiki ,Downtown Honolulu, Kakaako, and Ko Olina.

What is the GSA SmartPay® program?

Established in 1998, the GSA SmartPay program provides payment solution services to more than 250 federal agencies/organizations and Native American tribal governments. The program has travel, purchase, fleet, and integrated business lines.

What are the types of GSA SmartPay travel cards/accounts?

Individually Billed Accounts (IBAs)

- Most common travel card/account.
- Issued to an employee designated by the agency/organization in the employee's name.
- Used to pay for official travel and travel-related expenses.
- Only issued to federal employees or employees of tribes or tribal organizations.
- May be used for local travel only if authorized by written policy of the agency/organization.
- Agencies/organizations reimburse employees only for authorized and allowable expenses.
- Card/account holders are directly responsible for all purchases charged to the IBA account.
- Payment may be made directly by the card/account holder, agency/organization or in the form of a split disbursement in accordance with agency/organization policy.

Centrally Billed Accounts (CBAs)

- Established by the bank at the request of the agency/organization to pay for official travel charges and official travel-related expenses.
- Generally used to purchase common carrier transportation tickets for employee official travel through third-party arrangements, such as the GSA E-Gov Travel Service (ETS) for civilian agencies, the Defense Travel System (DTS) for the Department of Defense or permissible equivalent travel system.
- Agencies/organizations may also make purchases through their Travel Management Centers (TMCs), commercial travel offices and through other government contracts.
- Agency is directly billed and is liable for making the payment.
- Payment is made directly to the bank by the government.

Tax Advantage Travel Accounts

- Issued to an employee designated by the agency/organization in the employee's name.
- Used to pay for travel and travel-related expenses.
- Combines IBA and CBA transactions to provide tax exemption at the point of sale for rental car and lodging expenses.
- Charges for rental cars and lodging will be automatically billed to a CBA for payment, taking advantage of the government's CBA tax exemption status for those types of accounts.
- Charges for other travel-related purchases, such as meals and incidentals, are billed to the IBA portion of the account and will still incur tax. The individual traveler will still be liable for payment to the bank for those charges.





TLA is an entitlement for service members and their families, intended to partially pay for higher-than-normal expenses incurred by a member or dependent while occupying temporary lodging OCONUS. (Hawaii is considered OCONUS under this definition.)

The thought of living in a hotel for 30 days might sound glorious to some and like a death sentence to others. However, you can make a lot of money living in the hotel while waiting to move into on post housing, an off-post rental, or while waiting for a home you're purchasing off post to close.

BAH and COLA become effective immediately upon arrival on island if you sign in off leave at the airport if you are Army (Although it may take some time for finance to activate your Hawaii pay). While staying in the hotel TLA pays for your hotel room and per diem pays for your food. Ensure you sign in at the desk in the airport if you are Army to ensure your TLA and Hawaii benefits will begin.

- Hotel cost is reimbursed for up to 90 days depending on your circumstances. You will receive BAH and COLA while also collecting TLA and COLA. You could make an extra \$1400 every 10 days while looking for a home.
- You choose the hotel and make reservations up to six months in advance. Ensure the hotel you choose is on the TLA approved list or you may not be reimbursed. While there may be some Airbnb or vacation rentals that qualify for reimbursement you may be taking the chance at not getting reimbursed if you decide to stay anywhere not on the TLA approved list.
- To qualify for TLA you must be actively searching for a home and file paperwork with housing / finance every 10 days. Once you have signed a lease or have a home in escrow you no longer must search for a home and can stay in the hotel until the lease begins or the house closes. *Please check with housing and finance for details.

Pets are a part of the family, so it's important to take the time to know Hawaii state laws concerning your pets prior to you relocating here.

When traveling to Hawaii with pets, there are three quarantine options:

- 1. Direct Airport Release (DAR),
- 2. The 5-Day-or-Less program,
- 3. The 120-Day quarantine option.

Keep in mind that your pet is only eligible for DAR and the 5-Day-or-Less program if you've completed and submitted the paperwork at the correct time. Prior to your move, have a checklist and schedule for the following events:

- 1. Rabies Vaccinations
- 2. Working Microchip
- 3. OIE-FAVN Rabies Blood Test
- 4. Waiting Period
- 5. Documents
- 6. Submission of Documents
- 7. Pet Pick-Up

Inspection hours for dog and cats at HNL are between 0800-1700 daily. Pet owners must be sure to arrange flights to arrive by 1530 because it may take up to 1 hour for the airlines to transport a pet to the Airport Animal Quarantine Holding Facility. Pets will have to stay overnight at the Animal Quarantine Station if airline arrival times occur beyond 1630. Pick up for pets that stay overnight must be by 1000 or an additional \$59 will be charged.

Members of the military are permitted to ship one POV to Hawaii, or privately-owned vehicle, at the government's expense. However, there are some limitations and restrictions that exist regarding what types of privately-owned vehicles can be shipped, and under what circumstances. Motorcycles can be shipped in your Household Goods, but the weight will count against your total HHG weight allowance. (Most motorcyclesweigh about 400-600 pounds.)

Shipping a car to Hawaii means your vehicle will spend time on both a truck and on a boat, and timing both shipments can get complicated. Timing is everything when you're relocating, so to be sure your car will get where it needs to go when you need it to be there, book your shipment at least one month in advance of your preferred delivery date.

Here are a few steps to follow as you transition to the islands.

Step 1 — Booking: Here are a few choices in shipping carriers.

Step 2 — Prepping: Before shipping a car to Hawaii, you'll need to wash it thoroughly (inside and out), remove all personal items from the interior and truck, disable your car's alarm if you don't have a remote, double check that your car's tires are fully inflated, and drive it until the gas tank is just a quarter full. A lot of people will also get a quick tune-up before their ship date to ensure that the brakes and the battery are fully functional, though this isn't required.

Step 3 — Handing it off: On the day you hand off your car to your trucker (or drop it off at port if you prefer to drive there yourself), you'll sign off on a short inspection and hand over your keys. That's it! There's no extra paperwork you need to ship a car to Hawaii.

Step 4 — Picking it up: Your car will be inspected again at the port in Hawaii, and after that, you can drive it away. All you need to bring with you is your booking confirmation number and your vessel booking number, which we will give you once your shipment is scheduled.

If you're relocating to Hawaii, your vehicle will need to be registered in your new home county within a month. You can either get Hawaii plates and an in-state registration or get an out of state permit to operate your vehicle using your current plates and registration. This permit will be valid for a year. To do either, you'll also need to show your car shipping receipt and buy Hawaii auto insurance and your car will need to pass an inspection.





CY COUNTY YOUR FIREARMS TO HAWAII

If you move to Hawai'i and bring in a firearm of any description, you must register the firearm within five days after the firearm enters the state. If you were not born in the United States, you would need to provide proof of U.S. citizenship. Fees — you will be charged a one-time fee of \$43.25 (after January 1, 2019) for a fingerprint check. Payment must be made by Money Order or Cashier's Check only, payable to Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center.

- All firearms in Hawai'i must be registered whether they are serviceable and no matter how they are acquired. Registration is not required for firearms designed to fire loose black powder and for firearms manufactured before 1899, but permits are required.
- In exceptional cases when an adult applicant shows reason to fear injury or is engaged in the protection of life and property, the Hawai'i County police chief may grant a license to carry. For detailed information on who may be granted a license, see Section 134-9 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

Commund Sponsorship

Command sponsorship is the permission needed to have family members accompany you with full military benefits during your assignment overseas. Once you've made the request, you will receive specific instructions that must be followed. If approved, your military orders will specifically state that dependents are authorized. If you get married before you move, you must inform your commander and follow the procedures exactly as you receive them. Know that command sponsorship is not guaranteed. You will need to have a backup plan if you are denied.

NEED TO KNOW: A request for command sponsorship will be submitted to sponsor Family members who are already in the command. To qualify, a Soldier must have sufficient time in service remaining to complete the "With Dependents" tour (36 months for Oahu, Hawaii), and must have a minimum of 12 months service remaining on that tour after approval of command sponsorship. *NOTE: A First Term Soldier who marries a bona fide local resident after arrival in command is not required to serve beyond the originally established DEROS.* However, to qualify the Soldier MUST complete the "With Dependents" tour. The effective date of command sponsorship is the date the request is received and approved by the MPD, not the date Family members arrived in the command, or date legal custody is granted, etc. If Soldier is within 12 months of DEROS, or is on assignment instructions, he/she must apply for an FSTE to meet the overseas service criteria for command sponsorship.

The following documents will be submitted for processing a request for command sponsorship:

- DA Form 4187 (hard copy), with the following information included in Section IV (Remarks): (1) Name, Relationship, Date of Marriage (Spouse)/Date of Birth (children only). (2) Date of arrival in Hawaii; Current ETS date, and Current DEROS. (3) Statement of understanding to complete the normal "with dependents" tour (36 months for Oahu, Hawaii) or 12 months after approval of command sponsorship, whichever is longer.
- DA Form 5888 Family Member Deployment Screening Sheet. Soldier will complete Items 1 thru 7, Part A (Soldier/Family Member Data). The BN/Unit PAC will provide copies of this form and assist with the completion. 2 IMHW-HR Subject: Command Sponsorship (1) Item 8 (Authentication) will be completed by the S1 Representative after Family data is verified and DD Form 93 is updated. (2) Part B (Family Member Screening Results) will be completed by the Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) representative at Tripler Army Medical Center (TAMC). Call TAMC at 808-433- 4441 for an appointment before reporting for the EFMP screening. (NOTE: Family members must be enrolled in DEERS before they are eligible for the EFMPscreening).
- Copy of PCS Orders/Amendments to Hawaii.
- Copy of updated DD Form 93 showing all Family member(s) and current local address.
- Copy of current Soldier Record Brief (SRB) from eMILPO.
- Copy of marriage and/or birth certificate(s) for Family member(s), as applicable.
- Copy of Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) determination memo for secondary dependency (parents, parents-in-law, ward).
- Exception for Bona fide Residency is proof of legal Hawaii residency (Resident tax return, voter registration card from previous election, resident college enrollment and



Hawaii Birth Certificate are acceptable, while pay stubs, and W2s are not), or documents to show that they are officials or other employees of the United States.

- Copy of the court order for legal custody (TEMPORARY CUSTODY is not acceptable) for determination in cases of sole parent, divorce, or separation. Copy of the DFAS Memo for Legal Custody of Ward for brothers, sisters, nephews, etc. Copy of Pre- Adoptive Court Order or Final Adoption order for adoption cases. (NOTE: First term Soldiers (sole parents) who had children prior to enlistment had to have given up legal custody of their children to qualify for enlistment in the Army. Should they regain custody and apply for Family travel or for command sponsorship for children born prior to their entry in the Army and during the initial enlistment period, they will be discharged for fraudulent entry).
- A command sponsorship memo is NOT required for a child born in Hawaii of a command sponsored spouse.
- Single Soldier's, Dual Military Couples and for a member spouse who was later release from active duty, or separated/retired from the Service, who remained in the vicinity MUST apply for command sponsorship.
- Soldiers must update their DD 93 (Record of Emergency Data) to reflect command sponsorship for the new Family member. The PAC will submit a DA Form 4187 with a copy of the child's birth certificate or the DD Form 214 (Report of Separation from Active Duty) as applicable to Finance to request a change in COLA Status.
- Foreign national dependents: These individuals must be lawfully admitted for permanent residence and meet all other requirements for naturalization.
- After the Command Sponsorship request has been reviewed and all the required documentations are in order, the turnaround time is 3-5 days from the day of receipt at the Family Travel Section, DHR.




While the island of Oahu may only be about 597 square miles different regions of the island have their own unique climates, housing styles, neighborhoods, and personalities.

- Windward side (Kailua, Kaneohe, Laie) ~ To many, the Windward side is paradise within paradise. Some people call it the rainy side because it seems like it rains almost every day. Thanks to all that rain, Kailua, and Kaneohe (and Waimanalo) have the most lush, green, forests and mountains on Oahu. Much of the Windward side looks a lot like Kauai's north shore, with tall green mountains and thick foliage everywhere you look.
- East Oahu (Hawaii Kai, Kahala, Aina Hina, Kaimuki, Palolo) ~ Right after you pass Diamond Head on H1, the scenery starts to change. That's because just about everything east of Diamond Head is zoned as residential real estate. That means more homes, less high rises, less condos, and a more upscale feel to the area. Hawaii Kai was the first planned community in Hawaii, and it's clear as you look around that things are more orderly than in Town. The buildings are nicer, the houses are farther apart than in Town, and the traffic is lighter.
- West Oahu and the Ewa Plain (Ewa, Kapolei, Makakilo, Royal Kunia, Ko Olina) ~ Ewa is pronounced E' VA, as in, "there's so much traffic on my morning commute, it takes fo' Ewa!" People who live in Ewa drive a lot. Even if they don't drive far, they are in the car a lot. That's because there is exactly 1 way out of Ewa into Town, where most of the 50,000 people in Ewa work. But here's the positive side Ewa, Kapolei, and Makakilo are the newest developed cities in Oahu, which means the homes are new, the building and some roads, almost everything is new. So, on an island where everything gets rusted and oxidized by the sea air, the new housing can be very appealing.
- Leeward side (Makaha, Nanakuli, Waianae) ~ The Leeward coast has a beautiful coastline, but a bad reputation. Check the FBI crime statistics and you will find higher crime than other areas of Oahu. It's also a little run down, and the houses are generally not well taken care of. It's also the longest drive on Oahu from Waianae to Honolulu. However, there are a few nice areas, especially the Makaha Country Club and Mauna Olu Estates, where you can buy a beautiful custom built ocean view home for about \$1.5 million. They have large lots and great views. You just have to drive through all of Waianae to get there. Once you get to Mauna Olu estates, you will be amazed at how nice that area is.
- Central (Mililani, Wahiawa) ~ About halfway up H2 on the way to the North Shore, you pass through Wahiawa and Mililani. Mililani is another up and coming town that has a master plan. As such, its layout is rather good, especially in the new areas. There is old and new Mililani, and of course new Mililani is nicer because it's new! Housing here and in Wahiawa is a little cheaper than town, so a lot of people make the commute. It's very green up in this area, and the trees remind people of Japan a little bit. Around Wahiawa and Mililani are dozens of little communities. There are hillside homes, valley homes, flatland homes, country, city, you name it, it's there. Also, there is a large military contingent, because of the base right there in the middle of Mililani.



- Pearl City area (Pearlridge, Aiea, Halawa) ~ If you need to live near Town, but you don't want to live right in it, Pearl City and the Aiea area are a good alternative. With housing prices that are a little lower than Kailua and the East side, there are still great properties for sale here. As you might suspect it's near Pearl Harbor, and if you can get a home on Halawa Heights or Aiea Heights, chances are you will have a nice view of the harbor. Some homes have a view all the way to Diamond Head. From Aiea, you can get a view of both ends of the island, depending on the position of your house. Pearl City & Aiea: This area is located close to Joint Base Pearl Harbor Hickam and Ford Island. There is also the Aloha Stadium swap meet, Target, Pearlridge Mall, and many dining options.
- North Shore (Haleiwa, Sunset, Pupukea, Waialua, Laie, Malaikahana, Mokuleia, Waimea) ~ Big waves, country roads, and multimillion dollar houses. Locals will call this area "country," as in, "I'm going up country." Or "the waves in country are huge!" Life on the North Shore is different than most of the island. It's a little bit like living in Maui, Kauai, or the Big Island, except that you can get to Honolulu in about 40 minutes in no traffic. The famous Pipeline and Waimea Bay bring giant waves in the winter, and about a million tourists a year with them.







1. KAAU CRATER HIKE

Kaau Crater hike is 4-5 hours of waterfalls, rope climbing, a huge volcano crater, and panoramic views make this one of the best hikes on Oahu recommend to people looking for a challenge. This trail doesn't ease you in. From the very first moment, it throws you into a world of enchantment. After no more than five steps it felt like a scene in the middle of the jungle, fighting for survival, on the swivel looking for wild animals. A glistening creek was lined by majestic trunks, so tall it'll hurt your neck looking for the treetops. Dangling vines were strewn from the canopy as rays of sunlight broke through the dense foliage creating a natural theatre with a magical atmosphere. It truly is one of the best all-round hiking trails on Oahu especially if you are looking for a great ridge hike. Kaau Crater is one of the hikes on Oahu that does have waterfalls you can swim in along the way and in fact, at one stage you will have to climb up the side of the waterfall on degree angle.

2. SEVEN FALLS HIKE

The Seven Falls Hike follows a rocky stream through a narrow gorge. You should only bring a dry bag for this hike because there are parts where you will be swimming! You will find yourself wading through water and clambering over rocks for most of the trail and at some parts of the trail it becomes very narrow and the water deepens. At these points, you need to swim through the trail for a short distance before climbing up waterfalls with ropes. It is one of the most adventurous waterfall hikes on Oahu. It is possible to continue all the way through the Seven Falls, but you need ropes and to be a bit of a pro. Definitely one of the hikes on Oahu, which is only for very adventurous hikers and those willing to get wet.

3. PALI NOTCHES

Walking along the dangerously steep ridge hikes known as Pali Notches, gusts of wind threaten to knock you off either side of the cliff as you skitter up and down intimidating rock faces. This narrow ridge hike requires you to rock climb over the notches, which were supposedly created in the 1700s by King Kamehameha's warriors to harbor cannons and warriors on the lookout while they kept Nu'uanu Valley secure. Pali Notches is known as being one of the most dangerous hikes on Oahu and many people have fallen while on this trail so take extra caution. It's one of the closest hikes to the Honolulu downtown area so it's quick to reach for a sunset mission.

4. WAIMEA FALLS

Waimea Falls isn't your typical hike. There's no weathered-looking trail map or dodgy trail to walk. Instead, it's a paved path through some of Oahu's most stunning, lush botanical gardens with cultural and historical waypoints along the route. This is the easiest waterfall hike on Oahu! Waimea Falls is located at the back of Waimea Valley. The Valley was originally a division of land awarded to the High Priests of Oahu and, after a long and complicated history, is now owned by a non-profit run by Native15 Hawai'ians. Early in the day you'll find cultural presentations and local artisans on-site to enrich your visit – and break up the walk.







5. MANOA FALLS

If you look at most lists of Oahu family hikes, Manoa Falls is generally at the top. After all, it's not especially long or steep, it's right near Honolulu and there's an enormous waterfall at the end! There's also abundant shade throughout the hike, so you probably won't hear complaints about heat like you would at some of the other best hikes on Oahu. The valley views near the beginning of the trail are simply magical.

6. Makapu'u Light House

Makapu'u Point Lighthouse Trail is a 2.5 mile heavily trafficked out and back trail located near Waimanalo, Oahu, Hawaii that features beautiful wildflowers and is good for all skill levels. The trail is primarily used for hiking and walking and is accessible year-round. Dogs are also able to use this trail but must be kept on leash

7. Diamond Head

There is parking near the trailhead, however it does cost a \$5 fee to park in their lot. The trail cuts back and forth up the crater toward the ridge. The first set of stairs leads into an old military tunnel, which then takes you through several old military operations rooms and finally to the pillbox on top of the ridge! Once at the top there are beautiful views of Waikiki beach, the city of Honolulu, Diamond Head crater and the surrounding valleys. Great hike for the family, children, and elders. FYI - The sun beating down and the lack of shade can make this hike extremely hot midday. Going early in the morning helps avoid heat and the large crowds. Bring Water!

8. Makiki Valley Loop

The Makiki Valley Loop is an easy, shaded hike around the Makiki valley. The hike begins at the Hawaii Nature Center and you can choose to follow the trail east, or west. The hike takes you along Kanealole stream and offers beautiful views of Diamond Head and Honolulu. This area is a restoration preserve - please be respectful and malama ka aina. Consider wearing trail shoes, this hike can be muddy and/or slippery when raining.

9. Kaena Point

This 5-mile trek an easy (yet hot, there is no shade) hike to Kaena Point down a flat, dirt path. This secluded hike will reward you with beautiful views of the coastline, as well as the Waianae mountain range. Not to mention, there is a lot to see on this hike: A rock arch, a blowhole, lots of wildlife and even a secret pillbox (if you are willing to hike up the ridge). You can access this hike from both the Westside of Oahu (Yokohama bay) and from the North Shore of Oahu (Mokuleia). Please be aware of the Albatross (This is a bird sanctuary) as well as the Hawaiian Monk Seals that may be resting on shore. Be respectful and keep your distance.





1.LANIKAI BEACH

Nestled in the sleepy beach town of Kailua on Oahu's Windward side, Lanikai Beach is one of Hawaii's most picturesque and famous beaches. An offshore reef keeps the water calm year round, offering excellent swimming conditions from January to December. Less than a mile offshore are two small islands that house bird sanctuaries and those looking for an adventure can easily reach the islands by kayak. Other water sports to enjoy on the clear-blue waters include snorkeling (reef fish and sea turtles are common sights), sailing and windsurfing, while half a mile of fine white sand is the perfect setting for sunbathing. Beachgoers should note that parking is limited, as Lanikai Beach is sandwiched between residential housing.

2. KAILUA BEACH PARK

Located approximately one mile up the road from Lanikai Beach, Kailua Beach Park often is cited as one of Hawaii's best beaches. In fact, Kailua Beach Park was name "America's Best Beach" by coastal expert Dr. Stephen Leatherman, aka Dr. Beach, in 1998. With nearly three miles of light-colored sand and crystal-clear water, the park is the perfect spot to spend the day. While many enjoy playing in the gentle waves or learning how to windsurf, the 35-acre beach park also boasts a volleyball court and ample picnic areas where families can relax in the shade with a refreshing treat from local eatery Island Snow, a favorite spot of President Obama. Other nearby establishments, such as Buzz's Original Steak House and Kalapawai Market, are perfect for picking up a quick lunch or souvenir or choose to spend a bit more time and book a room at one of the many local bed and breakfasts or vacation rentals in the area.

3. WAIKIKI BEACH

Possibly the most famous beach in all of Hawaii, Waikiki Beach has been an epicenter for tourists since the 1950s. The 2-mile stretch of white sand coast is divided into several sections by various hotels, but each is connected to the other by a boardwalk. The peaceful waters offer good swimming and surfing year-round, and other fun activities abound, including surfing, canoe racing, stand-up paddling, volleyball and more. Attractions such as the Honolulu Zoo and Waikiki Aquarium are mere minutes from the beach, while world-class restaurants, entertainment and shopping destinations offer respite from a day in the water.

4. Sunset Beach

Situated on the historic North Shore of Oahu, Sunset Beach is a beautifully long expanse of beach that has enamored both locals and tourists for decades. During the summer, the blindingly blue ocean waters are calm and crystal-clear, making it the perfect destination for swimmers, snorkelers, and families. But as the winter months roll in, so do the large waves, making conditions suitable only for the most experienced of surfers. Surf fans are still welcome to watch pros ride these giants from the safety of the shoreline and take photos of this awe-inspiring natural phenomenon.





5. Ko'Olina Beach Park

Ko'Olina Beach Park is a Hawaiian paradise that is a must-visit for tourists. Located in Kapolei, this relaxing haven boasts of its scenic lagoons, beautiful resorts, clean sea water and white, fine-sand beaches. The place is designed to preserve nature (plants and trees are everywhere, so are rock formations and hill-like grounds) blending with modern architecture and exquisite urban planning, sort of a yin-yang of old and new. Family with kids, friends and couples alike will enjoy this place. The sunset is breathtaking, so a walk by the beach in the afternoon until evening is highly recommended.

6. PUPUKEA BEACH PARK

The beach park, also known as Shark's Cove, is the site of a reef where a large variety of marine life can be seen in their natural environment. The rocks here form many tide pools, so it's like swimming in an aquarium. Don't be put off by the name of this place. Though sharks occasionally drop in, their appearance is infrequent. You're more likely to see turtles and friendly reef life. A word of caution though: Wear shoes always. The coral and rock formations are sharp. During the calm summer months, Pupukea is a popular dive site. It is located near Waimea off Kamehameha Highway. There is a small parking lot, restrooms, and showers but no lifeguards. There are strict rules about taking marine life, sand, coral, shells, and rocks.

7. Hale'iwa Beach Park

A nice, safe place to picnic, play, wade and watch the bigger waves across the channel at Ali'i Beach Park. The beach is long, safe, and sandy. The name means "home of the frigate bird." How it got its name: Literally "house of the frigate bird," although the iwa aren't noted for being in this area.

8. WAIMEA

The biggest, most historic, most famous of all the North Shore breaks, Waimea sometimes has rideable waves when all the other spots are closed out. Waves can reach 25 to 30 feet offshore and even the shore break can be a powerful, awe-inspiring site. Stay well clear of the water and enjoy the spectacle. When the big waves are here, though, so are the crowds. Be prepared to walk a mile or more from your parking space to a prime viewing site. How it got its name: The red soil that washes into the water from the valley above gives the way its name, literally "reddish water."

9. Waialae'e Beach Park-Pahipahi'alua Beach

A long, wide, and sandy beach stretch of undeveloped beach, this is one of the lesser visited sites along the North Shore, with some nice calm areas for swimmers when the waves aren't too big. But when it's big, the currents get strong and the area lives up to its name, which means rippling or stirring waters. When you're driving up the Windward Coast toward the North Shore, Pahipahi'alua is the first great North Shore vista, the one that always takes your breath away with a sense of anticipation for all the bigger, more famous spots to come.

Pop up with one leg forward and the other anchoring you on the board, arms out, eyes forward, and rolling with the energy of the wave.

Total Army Sponsorship Program

A sponsor is a person from your gaining installation who can answer questions about Hawaii and help you before, during, and after your move. If you haven't been assigned a sponsor, you can request a sponsor through your new unit. Units try to match sponsors and service members by rank and family status. We also recognize that the service member isn't the only one affected by a move so kids can request sponsors, too. To obtain a sponsor contact the Installation *Sponsorship Liaison* at 808-655-8276 or DSN 312-455-8276 prior to your arrival.

How to Request a Sponsor

Note: This can't be completed until you've received notification from Human Resources Command.

- 1.Log on to https://actnow.army.mil.
- 2.Complete DA Form 5434. In the left column, click the "Messages" dropdown menu, "DA Form 5434."
- 3.Click "Create New Form."
- 4.Fill out all applicable sections (Sections 1, 2, 4 and 5).
- 5.Once complete, your sponsor will be notified.
- 6.You will receive notification in the "Messages" section if your sponsor changes in ACT.

Your sponsor should meet you at the airport when you arrive. He or she will escort you to the US Army Hawaii Liaison Desk near Baggage Claim 19 to sign in.

If you are not met by your sponsor, you should report to sign-in at the US Army Hawaii Liaison Desk at the Honolulu International Airport located near Baggage Claim 19.

You must sign in at the desk in order to begin TLA and inprocessing. The 24-hour CQ contact number is 808-282-0040.



Command Sponsorship

Dependents moving with Service Members to Hawai'i must be Command Sponsored. This means that the installation is able to support the Family Members' basic needs. To qualify for a "With Dependents" tour to Hawai'i, the Soldier must have served for 36 months with 12 months remaining on his or her contract. Exceptions may apply.

Command Sponsorship should be secured before Dependents come to Hawai'i. Command Sponsorship beings the day the application is approved by the Army. It does not begin the day family members arrive in Hawai'i.

It enables the Army to pay for flights and appropriate family housing. To receive Command Sponsorship, Dependents must be cleared through the **Exceptional Family Member Program**. EFMP ensures your family's special medical or educational needs are met before, during, and after your move.
