Housing

Portland & Vancouver offer more attainable entry points than Seattle. Bend and wine country command premium prices for lifestyle. Costs vary significantly by area and market timing.



Taxes

Oregon: No sales tax — great for everyday spending. **Washington:** No income tax — ideal for high earners. Choose your state strategically based on your financial profile.



Utilities & Transport

Utility costs are moderate. Portland's MAX light rail and Seattle's transit network reduce car dependency. Many PNW residents commute by bike or transit seasonally.



Groceries & Dining

Grocery costs align with national averages. The abundance of farmers markets, co-ops, and farm-direct food makes eating well surprisingly accessible at many price points.

Administrative Essentials

- Update your driver's license within 30 days of arrival
- Register your vehicle in your new state
- Update your voter registration
- Understand your new state's tax obligations
- Set up utilities: electric, gas, internet, water
- Locate healthcare providers & transfer medical records

Home & Neighborhood

- Research school districts if relocating with children
- Choose a neighborhood that fits your lifestyle & commute
- Explore local farmers markets, co-ops & community spaces
- Get weather-ready: rain gear, layers & good boots



Work & Lifestyle

- Plan your commute — research transit, biking & park-and-ride
- If remote, explore co-working spaces in your city
- Connect with local community groups, clubs & events
- Explore outdoor recreation passes: National Parks, state parks
- Join neighborhood social media groups for local insight

Frequently Asked Questions

The questions we hear most often — answered honestly and without the fluff.

Is Oregon expensive?

It depends on where you land. Portland is mid-range compared to Seattle or San Francisco. Bend and Lake Oswego trend higher. Wine country offers surprising value for the lifestyle.

Is Washington better for taxes?

Washington has no income tax, making it ideal for high earners. Oregon has no sales tax, which benefits everyday spending. Your best choice depends on your income and lifestyle profile.

Does it rain constantly?

Not constantly — but the gray, drizzly season runs roughly October through April in the lowlands. Summers are genuinely stunning: warm, clear, and low-humidity. Most locals embrace the rain.

Is the Pacific Northwest LGBTQ+-friendly?

Absolutely. Oregon and Washington rank among the most affirming states in the country. Portland, Seattle, and many surrounding communities have vibrant, welcoming queer communities and strong protections in place.

What's the job market like?

Strong across tech, healthcare, outdoor & apparel brands (Nike, Columbia, REI), wine & food industries, and creative sectors. Remote work has also expanded options significantly across both states.

Is wildfire season a concern?

East of the Cascades, yes — fire season (July–September) is real. Western Oregon and Washington, including Portland and Seattle, are largely protected. Air quality can be affected region-wide during peak events.

How far is the coast?

From Portland, the Oregon Coast is roughly 1.5 hours. From Seattle, the Washington coast and Olympic Peninsula are 2–3 hours depending on your destination.

What is the lifestyle pace like?

Slower and more intentional than most major metros. People work hard but prioritize weekends, outdoor time, and community. The culture deeply values balance — a core reason so many people choose to relocate here.

Which cities are most walkable?

Portland and Seattle lead in walkability. Portland's neighborhood grid is especially pedestrian- and bike-friendly. Olympia, Tacoma, and parts of Vancouver also offer excellent walkable districts.


What are winters like in the city?

Mild and rainy in Portland and Seattle — rarely freezing, with occasional snow. Winters in the mountains are entirely different: deep snow, world-class skiing, and breathtaking alpine scenery await within 1–2 hours of the city.

Relocating to the Pacific Northwest is highly lifestyle-driven. Housing availability, pricing, taxes, and market conditions vary significantly by city and are subject to change.
