What Oregon Is Known For

Oregon is known for its natural beauty, innovation, and a strong sense of place. Beyond rain and coffee, the state offers a mix of world-class employers, outdoor access, agriculture, wine country, and communities shaped by mountains, water, and forests.



- **Coffee & Food Culture:** Birthplace of Stumptown Coffee Roasters and a food-cart culture that turns nearly every block into a place to eat something new, alongside farm-to-table dining shaped by James Beard's Oregon roots.
- **Tech & Innovation:** Home to the “Silicon Forest” — Intel's largest U.S. operations campus in Hillsboro, plus Nike's global headquarters in Beaverton, Columbia Sportswear, and Adidas North America's Portland office.
- **Health & Research Leadership:** Oregon Health & Science University (OHSU) anchors the state's medical and research community in Portland, alongside Providence Health & Services, one of the state's largest employers.
- **Wine & Agriculture:** The Willamette Valley is one of the world's premier Pinot Noir regions, with nearly 1,000 wineries statewide. Oregon also grows about 99% of the nation's hazelnuts and is a top producer of berries, Christmas trees, and pears.
- **Stunning Outdoors:** An incredible landscape featuring Crater Lake National Park, Mount Hood, and the Columbia River Gorge. Mountains, coastline, high desert, and wine country all sit within a few hours' drive of one another.

Quick impression: Oregon blends big-city opportunity with easy access to forests, mountains, water, farms, and small-town character.

The Outdoor Lifestyle

Oregon is a place where the outdoors becomes part of everyday life. Scenic highways move through alpine passes, riverfront towns, vineyards, and evergreen forests, making weekend adventures feel close and accessible.



Something for Every Season

- **Hiking:** From easy neighborhood trails to routes on Mount Hood and the Pacific Crest Trail, trailheads are a normal part of weekend life here.
- **Rock Climbing:** World-class climbing at Smith Rock State Park draws climbers of every skill level, from first timers to seasoned crag rats.
- **Snow Sports:** Skiing, snowboarding, and snowshoeing at Mount Hood's resorts — including year-round skiing on the Palmer Glacier — keep winter just as active as summer.
- **Water Sports:** The Willamette and Columbia Rivers, the Oregon Coast, and Hood River's famous wind make room for kayaking, paddleboarding, whitewater rafting, and windsurfing.
- **Scenic Drives:** Routes like the Historic Columbia River Highway, the Mount Hood Scenic Byway, and the Oregon Coast Highway are consistently ranked among the top scenic drives in the country.

For new residents, the benefit is simple: Oregon makes it easier to build an active, healthy rhythm. You do not need to plan a major trip to get outside. In many communities, nature is only a short drive, bike ride, or walk away.

Why We Call It the Beaver State

Oregon is called the "Beaver State" due to the animal's central role in the region's early 19th-century fur trade.



- **Oregon State University mascot is Benny the Beaver:** Distinguished by its rare land, sea, space, and sun grant designations. Located in Corvallis, the R1 research institution is a global leader in robotics, forestry, and oceanography.
- **Oregon Trail:** Not just a computer game from 1970s. Oregon sits on a historical route that served a path for new opportunities and growth for the PNW.
- **City to Coast:** The city of Portland and Salem, OR are both the industrial and political force of Oregon, they are connected to some of the most scenic coastal fronts by a 1.5 hour drive.

Local mindset: There is so much to see in PNW. It's no wonder locals take advantage of holidays and weekends to do day trips in the state from coast to mountains.

The Unhoused Population & Community Action

Like many growing cities, Portland faces visible housing and homelessness challenges. Understanding the issue with compassion helps new residents see both the need and the many ways communities are responding.



- **The Landscape:** While many individuals become unhoused locally, studies indicate a portion of the unhoused population relocates from other cities and states; often due to Oregon's milder coastal climate and its social service networks.
- **Active Organizations:** Groups like Transition Projects, JOIN, Central City Concern, and Blanchet House are actively working on transitional housing, day centers, meal service, and case management to help people move toward stable housing.
- **What You Can Do:** As a new resident, you can make a direct impact by volunteering at local food banks, donating hygiene kits, and supporting local organizations that you believe in.

Community note: New residents often make the strongest connections by volunteering, supporting local services, and learning how each city is addressing housing needs.

Spotlight: Greater Portland — Metro Suburbs

Whether you are relocating from Seattle, from Washington state, or from across the country, the Portland metro area deserves a close look. Ringed by the Willamette and Columbia Rivers, this region gives you big-city access with small-town character.

Portland

Portland is the anchor of the region — Oregon's largest city and the urban core of the metro area. Known as the “City of Roses,” the city offers the Portland Japanese Garden, Powell's City of Books, a celebrated food-cart and restaurant scene, and a waterfront with views of the Willamette River and, on clear days, Mount Hood.

Lake Oswego

Lake Oswego borders Portland directly, just south of downtown, making the commute a non-issue. It is consistently ranked the #1 city for public schools in the Portland metro area, with lakefront living, low crime, and a polished, upscale feel.

West Linn

West Linn ranks as one of the safest cities in Oregon, with schools in the top-tier West Linn-Wilsonville School District. It has a genuine small-town feel, with river access, parks, and a walkable downtown at Willamette.

Beaverton

Beaverton is the heart of the “Silicon Forest” and home to Nike's global headquarters. It's one of the most family-friendly Portland suburbs, with strong schools, parks, and a growing, diverse tech-driven community.

Hillsboro

Hillsboro sits about 30 minutes west of Portland and hosts Intel's largest U.S. campus, anchoring the Silicon Forest. It's one of the fastest-growing cities in Oregon, with new development, walkable town centers, and a strong job base right at home.

Community Note: Many choose Portland Metro cities for investment growth opportunities by purchasing a home. Oregon has no sales tax, and the region offers a centralized location in the Pacific Northwest.
