- **Stunning Outdoors:** An incredible landscape featuring three National Parks; Olympic, Mount Rainier, and North Cascades. Plus, mountains, coastline, high desert, and islands all within a few hours' drive of one another.

The Outdoor Lifestyle

Washington is a place where the outdoors becomes part of everyday life. Scenic highways move through alpine passes, waterfront towns, vineyards, islands, and evergreen forests, making weekend adventure feel close and accessible.



Something for Every Season

- **Hiking:** From easy neighborhood trails to the Wonderland Trail circling Mount Rainier, trailheads are a normal part of weekend life here.
- **Rock Climbing:** World-class climbing at Index, Leavenworth, and Smith Rock draws climbers of every skill level, from first timers to seasoned crag rats.
- **Snow Sports:** Skiing, snowboarding, and snowshoeing across resorts and backcountry terrain in the Cascades and Olympics keep winter just as active as summer.
- **Water Sports:** Puget Sound, hundreds of lakes, and world-renowned rivers make room for sailing, kayaking, paddleboarding, whitewater rafting, and salmon fishing.
- **Scenic Drives:** Routes like the North Cascades Highway, Chuckanut Drive, and the Olympic Peninsula loop are consistently ranked among the top scenic drives in the country.

For new residents, the benefit is simple: Washington makes it easier to build an active, healthy rhythm. You do not need to plan a major trip to get outside. In many communities, nature is only a short drive, bike ride, or walk away.

Why We Call it the Evergreen State

Western Washington's weather is often misunderstood. The region is known for gray skies and light, steady drizzle, but not constant heavy rain.



That moisture is also what keeps Washington green throughout the year. It feeds evergreen forests, mossy trails, fertile farmland, and the lush scenery that gives the state its nickname.

- **The Solution:** To thrive here, locals live by the rule that “there's no bad weather, only bad clothing.” Investing in a good breathable raincoat is a rite of passage.
- **Stay Active:** Locals don't wait out the drizzle — they hike, run, and cycle right through it. When winter hits, the mountain passes open for skiing, snowboarding, and snowshoeing to beat the grey-sky blues.

Local mindset: The weather is easier to enjoy when you plan for layers, good footwear, and a rain jacket you actually like wearing.

The Unhoused Population & Community Action

Like many growing states, Washington faces visible housing and homelessness challenges. Understanding the issue with compassion helps new residents see both the need and the many ways communities are responding.



- **The Landscape:** While many individuals become unhoused locally, studies indicate a portion of the unhoused population relocates from other cities and states; often due to Washington's milder coastal climate and its robust, well-funded social resource benefits and support networks.
- **Active Organizations:** Groups like Council for the Homeless, Share, and Vancouver Housing Authority are actively working on transitional housing, emergency shelters, case management, and coaching programs for job placement and financial stability.
- **What You Can Do:** As a new resident, you can make a direct impact by volunteering at local food banks, donating hygiene kits, and supporting local organizations that you believe in.

Spotlight: Greater Vancouver, WA — All of Clark County

Whether you are relocating from Portland, Oregon or from across the country, Southwest Washington's Clark County deserves a close look. Sitting just across the Columbia River from Portland, this corridor gives you big-city access with small-town character.

Vancouver

Vancouver is the anchor of the region. Currently, Washington's fourth-largest city and the urban core of Clark County. Known for its history with Fort Vancouver National Historic Site, waterfront entertainment, restaurants, boutique shops, and walking trails with views of the Columbia River, Mt. Hood, and Mt. Saint Helens.

Camas

Camas borders Vancouver directly, making the commute a non-issue, and it's roughly 25–30 minutes to downtown Portland. It is ranked as the #1 safest city in Washington state, and the Camas School District is one of the most decorated, with Camas High School landing in the top 25 statewide and strong STEM programs driving graduation rates north of 90%.

Ridgefield

Ridgefield is one of the fastest-growing cities in Washington state. Known for a genuine small-town feel, with a walkable historic Main Avenue downtown, local events, and neighbors who actually know each other. Its signature features are the 5,200-acre Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge, wineries, and an 18-hole golf course.

Washougal

Known as the “Gateway to the Gorge,” Washougal sits just east of Camas, with front-row views of the Columbia River Gorge and Mount Hood. It has a developing waterfront district at the Port of Camas-Washougal which is expected to bring new restaurants, trails, and mixed-use development to the riverfront.

Battle Ground

Battle Ground sits near the geographic center of Clark County, about 25 minutes northeast of Portland, and has become one of the county's fastest-growing communities while holding onto its small-town identity. Residents still know each other by name. Today, residents enjoy Battle Ground Lake State Park, a growing wine scene, and walkable commercial districts like the Vintage District and Battle Ground Village.
